We have celebrated academic excellence and commitment from our students in our recent formal assemblies. Our school has fantastic facilities and experienced and dedicated staff.

Our Trade Training Centre's Hospitality Program has produced excellent results for all students who accessed it including students from Northlakes High, Gorokan High and Lakes Grammar Anglican School. Alternative educational programs have been developed, which include flexible timetables, work or work experience, and TAFE to assist a number of students to reach a suitable educational outcome.

We are creating diverse educational pathways to try to help <u>all</u> students achieve.

This year we continued to improve our attendance rates by using technology in the school to do in-class electronic roll marking, and also SMS messages to parents if a student is marked absent. Within the school, emphasis on 'being in the right place at the right time', having all equipment and not using mobile phones in class has helped teachers ensure that class time is productive and not interrupted.

Our focus is always on improvement, and by ensuring our staff has access to a wide range of training, and that the school offers a diverse curriculum; our students can all do very well if they aim to achieve their personal best.


and hope they enjoyed their Orientation Day activities last week.

Students have been keeping busy in these last few weeks with a variety of different studies being completed from Year 7- 12. Year 7 has been busy doing study appropriation on and recontextualisation with a study on the film adaptation of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, Gnomeo and Juliet. Year 8 has been completing a media unit on television in which they are currently composing their own "Soapy" scripts. Year 9 are studying a Shakespeare unit with a variety of different plays being studied from The Taming of the Shrew to Macbeth. Year 10 have begun an Area of Study to prepare them for their Preliminary studies, as this is the first Module they complete in both Year 11 and Year 12. This involves studying the concept of Change and representations in a variety of different texts. They have handed in their first major assessment task for their HSC which was a piece of creative writing linking to their Area of Study. #### The Student Representative Council Report

The SRC has had an amazing year this year, being heavily involved in acting upon student concerns and fundraising for worthy organisations.

In coordination with various staff groups students helped organise and run 'Green Day' in April. This involved assisting and running a whole school "emu parade", running a cake stall and coordinating with performing arts concerts to support the music department. The money raised from green day went toward the agriculture farm to build much needed new composting bins.

SRC leaders also attended the World Vision Global Leaders Convention (GLC). The students learned about the state of the global food index and the impact of this on the international community. Consequently, students decided to run the 40hr Famine. This became a whole school event. The Lake Munmorah SRC 'threw down the glove' challenging us to see who could raise the most funds. Funds went to World Vision's program in Ethiopia which is seeing yet another drought, much like the one seen in the 1980's.

'Pink Day' was a massive success. The students once again coordinated with staff to raise awareness of cancer and support for the McGrath foundation. A cake stall was set up, students coordinated with various staff to support a concert put on by CAPA, and a sponge throwing competition run with the school captain, the Principal Ms Rowley and Deputy Principals Mr Welham and Mr Boake finding their heads wet through their support. Total fundraising made over \$1200 for the McGrath foundation this year; a huge and generous effort made by the school community.

Other foundations supported this year were 'Jeans for Genes' and 'Canteen' (Bandanna day). Another notable achievement was the establishment of the Student Environment Committee set up independently by SRC students as with the aim to improve the school grounds and student environmental awareness.
