#### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

Over the first three weeks of this term, on each occasion I have had the opportunity to speak to students on assembly I have reminded them about the importance of achieving their 'personal best.' The next few weeks of learning are critically important to shaping students' end of year results which are reflected in their yearly reports and impact on their class placement for 2018. Students should be actively engaged in classroom activities and be completing homework/assessment tasks that have been set. In many subjects end of year examinations will occur in a few weeks and it is important that students are actively reviewing and reflecting on their previous classwork to prepare for these examinations at home on a regular basis. Ideally students should be actively engaged in home based learning activities for approximately 2-3 hours per week to ensure they are achieving their 'personal besť.

Teachers have identified recently an increasing concern with students using mobile phones whilst accessing toilet breaks from class. It appears many students are requesting to go to the toilet during class time purely to access their phones and check messages and social media updates. Some students are also organising to meet each other in the toilets using their phones to message each other to get out of class at the same time. Given these increasing have decided issues. we to implement a new policy that students will not be allowed to take their mobile phones with them when requesting to access the toilets during class time. Students will be asked to leave their phones in their school bags or in the care of the classroom teacher until they return to class. We ask parents to support us in this

#### Quicksmart Numeracy & Literacy Update

The students currently on the Quicksmart Literacy & Numeracy Programs are entering

their final few weeks of tuition. The programs run for 30 weeks, with students being withdrawn 3 times per week over that time. Instructors on the Numeracy program have started post testing some of their students and a short report will be sent home later this term. We have seen strong growth in basic numeracy skills across the board for students on the program, with their ability to recall information becoming steadily faster and with greater accuracy. The Numeracy instructors are very pleased with the progress their students have made and would like to take this opportunity to wish them the very best for their future academic endeavours.

For the Literacy students we have seen a similar pattern of improvement. Their reading fluency is improving week to week. Instructors have worked with students to also improve comprehension and have developed a whole range of comprehension strategies to use with students. The Literacy Instructors have also completed 6 days of training through the University of New England and are now qualified instructors in the Quicksmart Literacy Program. The intention is to continue to run the Quicksmart Literacy Program in 2018 for students who will benefit from the intensive tuition that this unique program offers.

I asked some of my students to interview other participants to get some feedback on what they thought about the Quicksmart program. Apart from the obvious responses about it providing a change from classroom routines and that they enjoyed the lollies, students were all very supportive of the program. They enjoyed the small group environment and were complimentary about their Instructors. Most enjoyed the pace of the program, particularly the use of flashcards. I am very pleased that we have been able to provide a learning experience that students have enjoyed and also benefitted from.

# Online portal helps Australians impacted by image-based abuse

From tomorrow, Australians who have had intimate images or videos shared without their consent will be able to access tangible support and advice through an online portal being piloted by the Office of the eSafety Commissioner.

New research released by the eSafety Office reveals a significant number of Australians have experienced image-based abuse with statistics as high as 1 in 5 for women aged 18-45, and 1 in 4 for Indigenous Australians.

"This is a world-first government-led initiative, empowering Australians who experience this insidious form of abuse with practical information and a range of options to help resolve their situation and relieve their distress," says eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant.

The research shows victims' intimate images were most commonly shared without consent on popular social media sites. Facebook/Messenger accounted for 53%, followed by Snapchat at 11% and then Instagram at 4%. Text messaging and MMS were other common channels for distribution.

"Australians will be able to report intimate images or videos that have been shared without their consent directly through to our portal. We will work with social media providers, websites and search engines to help facilitate the removal of the image-based abuse," says Ms Inman Grant.

While the research revealed that image-based abuse had severe impacts on victims' mental health and physical wellbeing, only one in four took action to resolve the issue, with 22 per cent indicating they didn't know what to do.

"Our portal now gives victims a place to seek assistance. Understanding that Australians reporting to us are likely to be in distress, the portal provides clear and concise information about the steps victims can take to reduce the impact of the abuse, in an easy and intuitive way," says Ms Inman Grant.

"During this pilot phase we plan to work closely with victims of image-based abuse and stakeholders, to help us ascertain the volume and complexity of reports and to inform the final features of our portal which will formally launch in early 2018," adds Ms Inman Grant.

#### Safety learning program

#### School Traffic and Parking Around Your Local Community



Parking rules are designed to stop vehicles from parking where it would be dangerous or inconvenient for others. Please consider the residents when parking in streets surrounding your school.

You must not stop your vehicle (that is, bring it to a stop and either stay with the vehicle or leave it parked) in the following circumstances:

- Double parked (that is in the road alongside a car that is parked)
- Across a driveway or footpath
- On a median strip or traffic island
- On footpaths and nature stripsOn or within 20 metres before a
  - On or within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing



Within an intersection

Within 10 metres of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights unless signposted otherwise



- In Bus Stop, Bus Zone, Taxi Stand or Taxi Zone signed areas
  - At least one (1) metre from any other parked vehicle, close as possible and parallel to the kerb, and facing the same direction as the traffic lane



Within three (3) metres of any double centre lines

Within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a bus stop

Adherence to signposting, linemarking and road rules around your school will assist in providing a safe environment for the school community and residents.

- $\checkmark$ School Bus lights - buses use signs and orange flashing 'wigwag' lights to warn motorists and pedestrians that they are picking up or setting down school children. The lights begin to flash when the bus stops and the doors are opened. They keep flashing for about 30 seconds after the doors close and continue even after the bus moves off. You must not drive past the bus in the same direction at more than 40 km/h while the 'wigwag' lights are flashing as there may be children crossing or about to cross the road.
- A School Zone is the area around a school with a speed limit of 40 km/h. Between the  $\checkmark$ School Zone and End School Zone signs you must obey the school zone speed limit. The school zone speed limit only applies on gazetted school days and during the times shown on the sign.
- $\checkmark$ A No Stopping Zone means no stopping at any time.
- A No Parking Zone means that you must not stop for more than two (2) minutes. You must remain in or within three metres of the vehicle. - No Parking Zones are suitable for 'Kiss & Ride' - but you must abide by the rules.





A Bus Zone means that the area is restricted for bus use only. If hours of operation are shown, the restriction only applies to this time. You may use this area outside of these times.
